After the new school curriculum was introduced by the Ministry of Education in 2020, NAMBTS has observed that numerous learners who matriculate do not continue donating after they have completed school along with students who graduate from tertiary education.

NAMBTS has been experiencing numerous shortages over the preceding year as donations at schools and universities have also dropped significantly. With the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic leading to the cancellation of numerous blood drives at educational institutions over the past two years, we need learners, students and trainees to continue donating blood at our various fixed sited centres and town clinics.

NAMBTS now offers transport for donors who donate at our fixed site centres, provided that a booking is made in advance. We have six fixed site centres around the country offering convenient hours and a comfortable environment for donations. Karsten has also committed to maintaining a healthy lifestyle in an effort to continue donating blood for as long as she can. She enjoys the entire blood donation process as she often donates with friends and the afterthought of knowing that you have done something remarkable for the community.

"I want to motivate fellow youth to donate blood; it's fun, quick and easy! Plus, who doesn't like free cookies?" the 17-year-old Windhoek Afrikaans Private School scholar concluded.

More than 1000 Northern learners and students donate blood during first term

More than 1000 school learners and students at educational institutions in northern Namibia have donated blood during the first term of 2022, the Blood Transfusion Service of Namibia (NamBTS) confirmed.

With blood shortages experienced around Namibia due to a drop in blood collections and increased demand from hospitals, NAMBTS spokesperson Titus Shivute emphasized that getting new donors is crucial to maintaining an adequate blood supply of blood. "Among the 1044 donors that donated during the first term, 700 donated for the very first time. This shows growth among donors in the northern regions and will go a long way in improving the proportion of Namibians who donate blood in the country", Shivute stated.

Less than 1 per cent of the Namibian population donates blood annually making it even more difficult for NAMBTS to ensure a constant sufficient supply of blood to hospitals. "We have tried to address this through key strategic approaches and getting more healthy young people such as students and learners to donate regularly is a priority for us. An average of close to 200 blood donations are needed daily to help." Shivute commented.





Peer Promoters commit to improving blood donations at their schools and tertiaries

Peer Promoters at various educational institutions around Namibia pledged to assist NAMBTS in the organization's plight to ensure that there is a constant sufficient supply of blood and blood products for patients around the country.

The commitments were made at six Peer Promoter training sessions which were held throughout the country as part of reviving the Peer Promoters programme at various schools. Secondary schools in the coastal towns of Swakopmund and Walvis Bay as well as the northern towns of Oshakati, Ondangwa and Ongwediva recently attended Peer Promoters training along with schools in Windhoek.

The Peer Promoters Programme has the overall objective of increasing the number of learners at participating schools who donate blood regularly by providing a few selected learners at each school with the training and the tools required to encourage their peers to donate blood. NamBTS also aims to ensure that the correct information is disseminated widely through the learners and various activities are planned at these schools to attain these goals.



NAMBTS scoops top honours at UNAM Career Fair

NAMBTS recently took top honours at the UNAM Career Fair and Expo held at the UNAM Main Campus in Windhoek. NAMBTS was voted Best Exhibitor at event ahead of other reputable organisations such as Mobile Telecommunications Company (MTC), Ministry of Health and Communications Regulatory Authority of Namibia (CRAN) to mention but a few.

NAMBTS provided FREE blood group testing at the three-day event, giving interested participants the opportunity to find out their blood types. A blood donation clinic was also set up at the event with 44 total blood donations made, potentially helping save the lives of 132 patients.

The tour included a brief presentation about NamBTS and its operations, a guided walk through our clinic area where blood donations are done and a brief guide through of our laboratories. Some of the highlights of the tour included brief rapid blood group tests for the pupils to find out their blood types, having a look at how aphaeresis blood donations are done and seeing how tests are carried out in our NAT (Nucleic Acid Amplification Testing) facility that considerably narrows down the window period, making blood and products even safer for patients in our hospitals.

The tour could be very beneficial to selected groups such as peer promoters, various medical students, biology learners and various other people who have a keen interest on the topic of blood donation.
